## **Information for Contributors**

- 1. Scope: Original research on any aspect of zoological science anywhere in the world.
- 2. Submission of manuscripts: Submission of a paper to the Editor, Department of Zoology, National Taiwan University, Taiwan, ROC, will be held to imply that it has not previously been published; that it is not under consideration for publication elsewhere; and that if accepted it will not be published elsewhere in the same form, in English or in any other language, without the written consent of the Editors. The original and two copies of the manuscript should be submitted.
- 3. Form of manuscript: Manuscripts must be written in English. Manuscripts should be typewritten, with wide margins, on high quality bond paper, using double or triple spacing throughout. Subdivision of manuscripts into Abstract, Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgments, and References is recommended. Manuscripts should begin with an English abstract and include a Chinese abstract at the end. A proposed running head in English of no more than 30 characters should be included. Two spaces are required between sentences.
- 4. Tables and figures: Tables and figures should be numbered consecutively with Arabic numerals, each one on a separate sheet with a concise and descriptive caption that is understandable without reference to the text. Line drawings should be originals, drawn clearly in deep-black India ink on smooth white paper or bristol board measuring no greater than 18 cm x 14 cm. Previously published and color illustrations will not be accepted except under special circumstances. Photos and photomicrographs that are to appear as a group should be mounted together with no spaces between individual images. Tables and figures should be placed in order at the end of the manuscript.
- 5. Nomenclature: Latin binomials should be italicized or underlined in the manuscript and the order and family to which the study animal belongs should be provided in the title or text. The generic name for each species should be written in full where it first occurs in the text and in the abstract. Where the generic name appears frequently in the text it may be abbreviated by using the initial letter. A specific name should not be used without an accompanying capitalized generic name.
- 6. Citation of specimens: The citation of specimens should be concise. Geographic names should be put in order of decreasing political magnitude. Only essential data concerning each specific locality should be given. Collectors should be cited by family name and collection number. If there is no collection number, the year of collection should be given. The repository for all voucher specimens should be clearly indicated.
- 7. Abbreviation: Only standard abbreviations should be used. Abbreviations should be checked for consistency. Periods should be used after all abbreviations except metric measures and compass directions.
- 8. References: The list of references should include only publications cited in the text. The references should be listed in alphabetical order at the end of the paper. Each reference should include the family name and initials of all authors, the year of publication, the full title of the article, the abbreviated title of the journal, and the volume and page numbers. References to books should include the chapter title, the title of the book, editor(s), publisher and city. In the text, a references should be cited by author's name and the date placed in parentheses, e.g. Kemp and Keith (1970), or both author's name and the date placed in parentheses, e.g. (kemp and Keith, 1970)
